# PIN Conference 2008: CONTEXT IS CONTENT! June 20-26, 2008

Elsewhere in this newsletter, John Maddock sends us all a warm invitation to PIN 2008 in Edinburgh. Emails from Bill along with John's invitation have provided a description of the theme of the conference. PIN 2008 is intended to offer the opportunity to consider and discuss how we can respond to the changes and challenges around us as the global economy and global societies continue to develop. The sessions will, I am sure, pose questions not only about how we respond – but also how we lead and shape change in our own institutions.

In addition to the specific theme, the context within which each PIN conference takes place forms an important part of the content. In this short article, I provide an indication of some of the points that make Scotland of particular interest to those in leadership and governance roles in the post-school sector.

Delegates can look forward to gaining an insight into a sector that is well developed but is continuing to change. Scotland offers a distinct system and institutional landscape within the UK. Scotland's Colleges, as the main providers of 'non-university' lifelong learning, operate as independent bodies in the public sector focusing on leading and supporting economic and social development.

Many of the issues for the post-school sector will be familiar to colleagues – labour market relevance; funding; the development of governance; curriculum renewal; succession planning; and leadership. However, the ways in which these are being addressed and the circumstances are, of course, different. Delegates at PIN 2008 will have the opportunity to meet institutional leaders in Scotland and to compare challenges and experience.

At a national level, Scotland offers a unique insight into the ways in which significant political change is shaping and being shaped by the college sector – often in a gentle waltz of common purpose but at times in something more of a vigorous highland fling as agendas clash and priorities compete. Elections in May 2007 (for the Scottish Parliament which was re-established in 1999 following a gap of 292 years!) resulted in the return of a Nationalist minority Government. The previous government in Edinburgh was committed to Scotland continuing as an autonomous entity in the UK. The new Government's commitment is to separation. Although this will not be achieved while they remain a minority, politics has changed in Scotland and turbulence has increased.

The challenge for individual institutions and for the college sector as a whole has been to keep post-school education high on the positive agenda of the government –irrespective of political complexion. Joint action by colleges has been critical in achieving this.

In addition to meeting institutional leaders in Scotland, delegates will have the opportunity to discuss these and other issues with politicians and senior policy staff at national level.

The topic and the context for PIN 2008 will inform and challenge. The location – Edinburgh in the soft early Scottish summer will enchant. I look forward to welcoming you to Scotland in June.

### A Conversation with One of the PIN Founders - Chet Gausman Interview conducted by LaVern Franzen, President - Central Community College

According to PIN records, Chester Gausman, president of Central Community College in Nebraska (U.S.), made the formal motion in Chicago on April 29, 1979, to formally organize the Post-secondary International Network. Chet's comment following his motion was, "Let's get on with it." And, those nine people, 3 from Canada and 6 from the U.S. truly did "get on with it."

After his retirement from Central Community College in 1984, Chet and his wife Mary moved to Custer, South Dakota, and they continue to reside and be active in that community. After returning from the PIN 2007 Conference, I thought an interview with Chet would be interesting for me and appropriate for other PIN members. The following are excerpts from my taped conversation that took place on May 2, 2007 with Chet Gausman:

# When/how did you first hear about the thought of an international organization for post-secondary education?

• "I had quite a few conversations with Dale Gibson, Oklahoma City Community College; Don Morgan, University of Minnesota; and Abe Konrad, University of Alberta, Canada, and they were discussing the idea of some kind of an organization where we could share what we were doing, the types of programs we had, our college organizations and so forth. At the time, it sounded pretty good to me. So then the next year we had a meeting in Chicago and that's when I think the name was picked and we started the group."

# Why did you decide to make the motion to adopt the Document of Understanding and the slate of officers?

• "After visiting with some others and the people I mentioned earlier, I thought it certainly wouldn't do any harm; it would do a lot of good for us to know what was going on in other locations, sometimes in other countries—learning things that quite possibly were way ahead of us."

<u>Did you sense any resistance from your Board of Governors to CCC getting involved in international</u> education?

• "No, not at all. I don't think any of our board members objected; no everything was positive. It wasn't going to cost very much. That was always a question, 'How do you spend the tax payers' money?' But, they thought it was very valuable and I know of no concern expressed by any board members."

From what you know about PIN today, or at least when you retired, is PIN what you discussed and planned for?

• "Yes, in fact, I think it has improved, extended to other countries as you know and I saw many benefits. I think PIN is a wonderful organization." In the fall of 1984, because of their PIN membership, Chet Gausman and Dale Gibson from Oklahoma City Community College were designated by Oklahoma State University and the World Bank to go to Jordan to analyze their higher education system and do what they could to help. Chet wrote the format for the proposed "community college" system for the Kingdom of Jordan patterned after Central Community College. The proposed plan was soon implemented. According to Chet, "In the Kingdom, you don't have to wait forever for something to happen because the King says yes or no. King Hussein said, 'Yes', right away."

Fortunately, for PIN member colleges, people such as Chet Gausman had the foresight, the vision, to look into the future and see that global education was going to become a part of education programs around the world. Because of their efforts, our colleges, and certainly our students are the beneficiaries.

### Olds College Delegation Meets with President of Haiti to Discuss Projects College New Release

Olds College's growing relationship with a partner university in the Dominican Republic landed President H.J. (Tom) Thompson in the Haitian Presidential Palace recently. Thompson was invited to the Universidad Agroforestal Fernando Arturo de Merino (UAFAM) university in the central region of the Dominican Republic as a college official to share his expertise in governance and leadership. Olds College staff members have been collaborating with UAFAM on agricultural, land and water management projects for the past year. Several Olds College instructors have traveled to the university to share their expertise in golf course management, technology training, mine reclamation, agriculture and horticulture.

The university and government officials are looking to Olds College to provide guidance on strategic projects that will build a better quality of life for the people of the Dominican Republic and its neighbouring nation of Haiti. With 62 percent of residents in the Dominican Republic living below the poverty line, and 94 percent of neighbouring Haitians living in poverty, leaders are looking with urgency on solutions that will impact the population's health and well-being.

"Our goal is to support UAFAM in developing research, training and development opportunities at their university, and that work has been underway for over a year now," said Pat Bidart, Associate Vice-President Academic. "UAFAM is researching the possibilities of working with the governments of the Dominican Republic and Haiti in regards to reforestation and poverty reduction. Olds College is researching the potential of partnering with UAFAM on specific development projects in Haiti and the Dominican Republic."

Plans are underway for a student study trip to the Dominican Republic during spring break in February, which will enable Olds College students to work on two development projects with UAFAM while earning credit toward their college programs. Future study trips may expand to involve development work in neighbouring Haiti.

President Thompson was invited by Dominican Republic government officials to meet with officials from the Government of Haiti and UAFAM, to discuss possibilities to improve the economic condition of people living in Haiti. "Haiti President Preval stated that projects are only sustainable if we spend time with individuals and teach them the skills to have a better life," said President Thompson. "Olds College's expertise and international stewardship could really assist in affecting change for individuals in that nation. We are looking forward to exploring this further."

# Sustainable Living a Team Challenge Submitted by Phil Ker, President, Otago Polytechnic

Otago Polytechnic is preparing to launch an innovative tertiary challenge aimed at creating and inspiring solutions to the challenges of sustainable living for the benefit of the whole country.

SHaC 09 - the Sustainable Habitat Challenge - tasks university and polytechnic teams with researching, designing and building a home using less resources and more sustainable practices over a period of 18 months.

It is envisaged that to compete sucessfully, teams will need to be comprised of students from a broad range of disciplines including architecture, design, communication and construction. Completion of the project is likely to require education providers to form significant working relationships with progressive local businesses and their local councils.

"New Zealand is trailing the world in taking affirmative action to adress our needs for sustainable ways of living and working," explains Alistair Regan, Group Manager of Creative Technologies at Otago Polytechnic. "The aim of this challenge is to get tertiary students to work together in a real world scenario and engage our communities in the need to make market choices and lifestyle changes that reduce our carbon footprint.

"Although competitive in nature, the aim of the challenge is to discover and share ideas and information about the sustainable lifestyle choices available to us as a nation."

Teams will be required to address the challenges of sustainable living including waste minimisation, energy efficiency and low carbon emmissions. They will then have to build their houses and disseminate their designs through public awareness campaigns culminating in a symposium in Dunedin where all groups will present their projects and awards will be made.

Otago Polytechnic has initiated the Sustainable Habitat Challenge as part of their commitment to developing themselves as a sustainable organisation and providing leadership in sustainable education and training in New Zealand into the future.

The SHaC09 proposal was awarded a grant of \$270,000 through the Ministry of Education 2007 Sustainable Management Fund to develop the Challenge for launch. Otago Polytechnic is now in the process of finalising judging criteria and assembling a national steering group for the project.

# Georgian Ready to Help In Africa AIDS Struggle By Brian Tamblyn, President and CEO Georgian College

"I have spent the last four years watching people die." With these words Stephen Lewis, former United Nations Special Advisor for HIV/AIDS in Africa, began the 2005 Massey lecture series, "A Race Against Time." An articulate and charismatic speaker, Lewis brought the same message to the academic vice presidents from all Ontario colleges in a May, 2006 meeting. He challenged them to look at the HIV/AIDS pandemic facing the African continent and determine how the Ontario college system could become part of the solution.

It is important to note that the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) now allocates the bulk of its international aid to Africa. Canadian assistance will focus on five key areas of intervention: governance, health (including HIV/AIDS prevention and control), basic education, private sector development and environmental sustainability. It is also worth noting that international education is increasingly important to Canadian postsecondary institutions, and Georgian alone has some 400 international students studying at our Canadian campuses, as well as a large number studying at off-shore locations.

Georgian was one of 11 colleges which took up the challenge and contributed to an exploratory visit to Zambia to assess the country's needs and the most effective way for the colleges to assist.

John Bobbette, our associate vice- president of community education and international services, was one of four college representatives selected to participate in the mission. The group toured the country and met with science, technology and vocational educators. Zambia is stable politically, the language of business is English, their road infrastructure is sound, and they have a comprehensive national strategy as well as regional sub-plans to combat the pandemic.

However, 1.2 million people have AIDS and 76,000 are on anti-viral medication. Additionally, Zambia has 570,000 orphans and vulnerable children, and 79 per cent of their 11.9 million-population is unemployed. Without a vibrant workforce, they lack a sufficient tax base to provide required educational and socials services. CIDA has identified education as one of the best investments in terms of economic and social development.

Mission participants prepared a draft report that outlined three potential ways colleges can assist in addressing the pressing humanitarian need in Zambia. It is estimated that the country has a critical need for 25,000 health care workers, but their educational system is cumbersome and it takes seven years to obtain a Bachelor of Nursing degree, compared to four years at an Ontario college and university.

Ontario colleges also offer certificate programs in such disciplines as Personal Support Worker, Health Care Aide, Practical Nursing, Paramedic, and Midwifery. The Zambian educational system includes colleges, and by modeling their health education on the Ontario college system, they could be able to increase the number of essential health care graduates and workers.

Secondly, colleges could be involved with twinning projects that would build capacity in Zambia. Sharing expertise in technical fields, entrepreneurial training and mining would contribute to the building of their economy.

# Christchurch Polytechnic Institute of Technology Excels At Teaching and Partnerships with Industry

Selena Chan, from the CPIT (Christchurch Polytechnic Institute of Technology) School of Food and Hospitality, has won the prestigious Prime Minster's Supreme Award for Tertiary Teaching Excellence. Chan's win is the second year in a row that a staff member from CPIT has won the coveted award that recognises excellence in teaching at a tertiary institution. CPIT is the only polytechnic or institute of technology whose staff has received the Prime Minister's Award.

The excellence awards for outstanding tertiary teachers were established by the New Zealand Government in 2001 to recognise and encourage excellence. There are up to nine awards of \$20,000 each and a supreme award, the Prime Minister's Award of \$30,000, which was been won by Selena Chan. Chan, who has worked at CPIT since 1980, said the award is an acknowledgement of the hard work everyone does at the CPIT School of Food and Hospitality.

CEO Dr Neil Barns said he was delighted with Chan's success, which is the second year in a row a staff member from CPIT has received the Prime Minister's Supreme Award, and the third time CPIT has won an excellence award. (In 2006 Karl Dodds won the Supreme Award and in 2003 the Food and Hospitality Cookery Team won an award for excellence in cooperation and collaboration)

Relationships with industry provided the impetus for the newest CPIT partnership - the new Plastics and Polymers Centre that opened recently. Despite the New Zealand plastics industry employing 8,000 people and generating around \$2 billion annually, no training facility for the delivery of trade qualifications in plastics technology or in plastics processing has been available in New Zealand, since the closure of the facility at Manukau Institute of Technology some years ago. With massive growth in the national plastics sector predicted, and competition for workers from the Australia plastics industry, local businesses approached CPIT to develop training programmes to address staff and skill shortages.

Neil Barns, CPIT CEO, said with local industry support CPIT successfully applied for Tertiary Education Commission (TEC) funding through the Innovation and Development Fund (IDF).

"In liaison with Plastic's industry representatives, CPIT put together an application to the TEC for a capability grant to setup a Plastics and Polymers Centre for the South Island", said Neil. "The successful application provided the \$1.5 million funding required for the centre, along with equipment purchases and generous donations from local businesses."

The CPIT Plastics Centre continues a tradition of innovative partnerships with industry, and is located at the CPIT TradeFIT Centre, also a world-class partnership project with the building and construction industries of the Canterbury region.

# International Highlights from Box Hill Institute Submitted by Jennifer Oliver, Executive Director Learning & Academic Affairs

Box Hill Institute has had a very exciting year and is certainly going a long way to achieve its object of being a leading global educator. Recent International Highlights include:

### **Victorian Export Awards**

Box Hill Institute was recently awarded the Governor of Victoria Export Award for Education for 2007. This is an outstanding achievement considering that the Institute won the same award last year and then went on to win the Microsoft Education Award at the National Australian Export Awards for 2006. This was the first time any Australian TAFE Institute had won this prestigious award.

#### **Student and Staff International Exchange Program**

We have sent over 40 students accompanied by staff to Southern Alberta Institute of Technology (Canada); ITE Singapore and Kirkwood Community College in Iowa as part of our Global Exchange Network initiative. Students from the Building and Furniture Studies Centre have also participated in

exchanges to Denmark and students from Performing Arts joined in workshops in the Prague Music Festival.

### **Australia-Pacific Technical College (APTC)**

Box Hill Institute is one of the major providers for the Australia-Pacific Technical College. We have now been contracted by AusAID for the implementation of the project for a period of four years (2007 – 2011) delivering over 1360 graduates from the Pacific Islands with qualifications in Hospitality, Tourism and Hairdressing. The project is valued at over AU\$27 million. Project activities include construction and procurement in Fiji, Samoa and Vanuatu; student marketing, recruitment & management; industry liaison and course development and delivery. Initial intake of students occurred on schedule in July 2007 in Vanuatu in the field of Commercial Cookery. Further programs will be delivered in Samoa and Fiji from January 2008 and include Certificate III or IV programs in Commercial Cookery, Patisserie, Hospitality Supervision/Operations, Tourism Operations, Hairdressing and Baking. APTC will also provide teacher training through the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment.

#### **Venetian Macau Resort Hotel**

The integrated resort hotel opened in August 2007 with the aim of transforming the entertainment industry in Asia. The second largest building in the world, The Venetian Macao includes a 3,000 suite hotel, the world's largest casino, 350 premium retail shops and 100,000 square metres of convention and exhibition space. The project involved the management and coordination of training programs, customisation and licensing of resources, and training delivery for 2,000 staff in the areas of Front Office, Housekeeping, Food & Beverage, Stewarding, Train the Trainer and Leadership development. The project also included a major 7 day simulation exercise with 3,000 non-paying guests and activities which were designed to prepare the hotel employees and systems to cater for the hard opening on 28 August 2007of the largest integrated resort and casino in the world.

### **Singapore Workforce Development Agency (WDA)**

Box Hill Institute has been working for the Singapore Workforce Development Agency over the past 3 years in the development of their Workforce Skills Qualification (WSQ) system. In partnership with Gordon Institute (Victoria, Australia) and Southern Alberta Institute of Technology (Canada), BHI is developing the Singapore Process Industries WSQ. This project will deliver a qualifications framework, competency standards and training arrangements for occupations within the chemicals, engineering services, environmental technology and pharmaceuticals industries. This new training system will improve quality, productivity and safety within these large and growing sectors which currently employ over 700,000 persons in Singapore.

# Southern Alberta Institute of Technology Update (SAIT) Submitted by Gord Nixon, Vice President - SAIT

2007/08 is proving to be a very busy year for us at SAIT. On the academic programming side, we've submitted our first Baccalaureate degree proposal (B.Sc. in Internetworking) to the Alberta Government, and are now getting feedback from the Government on this proposed degree. We are working on three additional Baccalaureate proposals, and plan to submit these to the Alberta Government by the end of this academic year. We're also in the midst of a major redesign of many programs in the School of Information and Communications Technologies, with our new program offerings starting this fall semester. Finally, SAIT recently participated in the launch of the Lois Hole Alberta Digital Library. This \$30 million Alberta initiative gives Alberta students, faculty, and researchers access to a huge number of online library resources anytime, anywhere. SAIT was one of

five Alberta post-secondaries that took part in a unique simultaneous broadcast to launch this significant initiative throughout the entire province.

On the facilities side, SAIT has just completed renovations on 150 instructor offices and 20 labs/shops, and we will continue to work on upgrading and renovating instructor offices and lab space during this academic year. Construction of our new student residence is well underway; when it opens in the spring, it will provide on-campus accommodation for more than 700 additional students, on top of the students already living in our existing residence. Having so many additional students living on our main campus will have an impact on our existing on-campus student services and facilities, and will create an even-more dynamic and vibrant campus atmosphere.

Finally, we continue to expand our international activities. We've just finished hosting a large delegation of students and faculty from Box Hill College (Melbourne) and ITE (Singapore), who visited us for a three-week study tour as part of our Global Education Network. We are currently hosting a smaller delegation of students and faculty from Kirkwood College (USA), another Global Education Network partner. Our students and staff have also been involved in international study tours and exchanges to countries including Australia, Scotland, Thailand, Denmark, Austria, Greece, and England. SAIT also continues to be very involved with the League for Innovations, and will send more than 50 faculty and staff to the upcoming November conference being held in Nashville, Tennessee.

# Lakeland Community College Celebrates 40 Years - Web Site Takes a Look Back in Time College News Release

Lakeland celebrates its 40th anniversary with a look back in time in the newly unveiled 40th Anniversary Web site. The college first opened its doors to students on September 25, 1967. Visitors to this site at www.lakelandcc.edu/40th are encouraged to send in their fondest memories of Lakeland, view the photo gallery and the timeline, and even take a glimpse into what the year of 1967 was like. A video section links to taped interviews from a college founder, faculty member, and a graduate, as well as a short history of the college's landmark: The Armington Clocktower.

"Forty years ago Lakeland's first students showed up to take classes in rooms rented in the former Cleveland Trust Building in Painesville," said current college President and 1974 Lakeland graduate Morris W. Beverage, Jr. "We've come a long way since those days. So have our students. So has our community."

Lakeland Community College was conceived in 1964 when a group of 22 visionaries gathered at Mentor Recreation Park (now Garfield Park) to discuss a radical new idea then: to establish a community college in Lake County. Led by Mr. Erwin Maus III, then the general manager of the News-Herald, they talked about the opportunities that such a college would bring to the area. They moved quickly and by 1967 the first students were sitting in class.

Fast forward 40 years and Lakeland has evolved into a vital and vibrant part of the community, offering credit and non-credit courses, professional development and cultural opportunities and partnerships with area businesses, making it a hot spot of education and learning.

"It's been a great 40 years. Now we get to start the next 40," said Beverage.

Founded in 1967, Lakeland was the first college in Ohio founded by a vote of the people. As a

community college, making higher education accessible is a priority. The college continues to develop programs and classes to meet the needs of students, employers and the community.

# **Durham College Celebrates 40 Years of Post-Secondary Excellence College News Release**

Durham College alumni and retirees received a warm welcome back to campus on September 18 as the college marked the 40th anniversary of its first day of classes with a celebration and a retrospective look at its tremendous growth over the last four decades and its ongoing commitment to the success of students and graduates.

Programs are offered in the high-demand areas of applied sciences and technology, business, communication arts, design, emergency services, health and community services, information technology, integrated studies, justice, and skilled trades and apprenticeship.

Dr. Gordon Willey, Mel Garland, Dr. Gary Polonsky and Myers have all served as president of Durham College over its history, helping it grow to become the premier college in Canada for career-focused students who succeed in a challenging, supportive and inclusive learning environment.

# Mohawk College Ready To Help Get the Job Done In Averting A Province-Wide Skilled Trades Shortage College News Release

Mohawk College supports the call for a provincial strategy to solve an escalating skilled trades shortage that threatens economic growth and prosperity.

A Conference Board of Canada report released today predicts that Ontario will face a labour shortage of more than 360,000 skilled trades people by 2025. The report warns of a perfect storm of retirements, slowing population growth and increased demand for skilled trades. "Ontario will soon be entering a period where pressures begin to mount significantly," according to the Conference Board of Canada.

The report was commissioned by Ontario's Workforce Shortage Coalition, with representatives from business, industry, labour and education. The coalition is calling for the establishment of a Premier's Council on Skills and the development of a comprehensive provincial skills strategy.

"At Mohawk, we're working with our industry partners and government to train more students with the skills and attitude to get the job done," says President MaryLynn West-Moynes. The college is

investing \$21 million in new construction and renovations at the Mohawk STARRT (Skilled Trades and Apprenticeship Research, Resources and Training) Institute so enrolment in skilled trades programs can grow by almost 75 per cent.

"Mohawk is one of the largest apprenticeship trainers in Ontario," says West-Moynes. "We have the faculty, the facilities and the industry partnerships to be part of a provincial solution to keep our economy strong."

# Durham College Opens Spectacular Campus Recreation and Wellness Centre College News Release

Durham College celebrated the importance of a healthy mind and body on September 12, with a grand opening ceremony and open house for the spectacular 90,000-square-foot Campus Recreation and Wellness Centre (CRWC) expansion, which also serves the University of Ontario Institute of Technology (UOIT) at the two schools' shared Oshawa, Ontario campus.

The new facility houses a plethora of athletic and recreational services, including the FLEX, a 10,000-sq.-ft. fitness centre featuring state-of-the-art cardio and weight machines; two aerobic/dance studios; two training rooms for sports training and fitness-related classes; and student and staff locker rooms complete with towel service and saunas. Student athletes will be able to showcase their skills in the new 28,000-sq.-ft. triple gymnasium, which has the capacity to seat 2,000 spectators and also houses an elevated indoor jogging/walking track.

The CRWC is also home to the college's expanded Health Centre. In addition to featuring a full-service pharmacy, the centre provides first-class medical, counselling and health education services to students and staff. The medical clinic within the centre features extended hours of service, on-site doctors and nurses, on-site counselling and a variety of alternative health services, including massage therapy, physiotherapy, acupuncture, nutritional counselling and chiropractic and orthotic services.

The high-tech equipment in the lab will enhance the top-notch training students in NAIT's Instrumentation Technology Program and Instrumentation Apprenticeship Program are currently receiving. "Imperial Oil is a forward thinking company which recognizes NAIT's role in addressing the skills shortage," says Dr. Sam Shaw, NAIT's President and CEO. "The money is going to two key areas: people and technology."

"Imperial Oil has a long history of supporting education and community initiatives," said Monica Samper, President, Imperial Oil Foundation. "That's why we're pleased to be working with NAIT to expand programs that will focus on providing greater education opportunities for skilled workers that are so critical - not just for our industry, but for the country as a whole. The lab, which is entirely enclosed by glass, includes a two-storey high distillation column similar to what students will work on in oil refineries, an absorber stripper unit which is used in the gas industry, a pipeline to carry a variety of liquids and blending equipment used to make products such as gasoline.

Half of Imperial's donation will fund the lab, the other half is for Aboriginal initiatives. "NAIT has done an excellent job developing programs to encourage Aboriginal students to pursue post-secondary education and when they are at NAIT, helping them succeed," says Dr. Shaw. "The Aboriginal population is one of the greatest untapped sources of skilled labour in Canada."

- 6. Faculty Exchange and Visit Program Application are submitted to Executive Director, Bill Warner.
- 7. The Executive Committee reviews all applications at the annual meeting.
- 8. The Executive Committee will identify the award recipients.
- 9. The PIN Executive Director will notify the successful and unsuccessful applicants.
- 10. The \$1,000 (US) stipend check will be sent to the college president, who will make the award to the faculty/staff member.
